CHINLONE: TRADITIONAL SPORT OF MYANMAR

Chinlone is played with a ball woven of rattan and is a combination of sport, dance, and elegant movement. Chinlone has played a prominent role in Myanmar for nearly 1,500 years, and the stylistics of performance are artistic as it is heavily influenced by traditional Burmese martial arts and dance. The essence of chinlone is non-competitive, as the focus is not on winning or losing, but how beautifully one plays the game. Played by KapCC students of Asian 100.

TOKUNOSHIMA: ETERNAL MUSIC OF THE SANSHIN

Local songs are called shimauta (island's songs) and people love to sing the songs in local festivals or celebrations. Sanshin is a traditional musical instrument played when people sing shimauta. Many songs are sung in the local language, and the lyrics often describe people's daily lives, teachings, love, and tragedy.
